Learning and Teaching Strategies:

Teaching methodologies underpinning this module will include the utilisation of:

Drawing primarily upon constructivist, dialogic, socioculturalist and meta-cognitive teaching methodologies, this module will extend and build upon prior learning from social work methods during year 2. A range of small and large group strategies, will be employed to encourage peer learning, formative assessment processes and feedback, as well as visual, didactic and auditory (transmission) teaching methodologies which considers differentiation in student learners and learning preferences.

Syllabus outline:

Semester One: What is social work theory and how does this relate to epistemological and ontological perspectives in the social sciences. Theories underpinning the history and development of casework in social work. How social work theories and methods change historically. Revisiting paradigms in wider theoretical (epistemological and ontological) perspectives. Pathologising in Case Work: Alternative paradigms for practice. Rational technical and practical moral activity social work, Science Vs Creativity, positivism verses naturalism. Dialectical ways of understanding social reality. Lay theorising and anti-discriminatory practice, creativity and critical social work practice. Social Work & modernity (positivism and empiricism), social constructionism, post-modernism, post-structuralism, feminism, Marxism, ethnography, critical realism, functionalism, radicalism, humanism, narrative theory, existentialism.

Semester Two: The teaching of this module is brief in semester two based on practice placement timings and so these three weeks primarily focus upon critically reflecting upon the knowledge gained during this module and applying this to contemporary practice demands, ethical dilemmas, the social work role and task and policy/ideological context.
