Module aims

Students will be expected to develop a critical understanding of the key concepts of English and Welsh land law related to: the ownership of family property, the regulation of leases and the law of mortgages; and the distinctions between legal and equitable rights, personal and proprietary interests and registered and unregistered land.

Assessment

Indicative Assessment Tasks:

This section outlines the type of assessment task the student will be expected to complete as part of the module. More details will be made available in the relevant academic year module handbook.



Assessment 1 (In-Class MCQ Exam): Students will sit a one-hour open book exam. The exam will consist of 12 multiple-choice questions (MCQs) on a range of land law topics already covered on the module. As the exam will consist of 12 MCQs, students are advised to spend approximately five minutes on each question. Students are permitted to use their notes, textbooks, and statute books during the exam. However, electronic devices, such as mobile phones and laptops are not permitted.

Assessment 2 (Memorandum): Acting as Trainee Solicitor, students will investigate title to land on behalf of their client and then write a memo to their supervising solicitor outlining the key issues based on their findings. The word count for the memo is 1,500 words. Please note that students who exceed the word count by more than 10% will have 5 marks per 1000 words excess deducted from their final grade. Due to the practical nature of the assessment, students should not include footnote citations, though they must still ensure that their work is their own and that any direct quotes are provided in quotation marks. Statutes and case names should also be provided where applicable. A table of sources should be used instead of a bibliography. A draft memo template will be provided.

Assessment 3 (Client Interview): Students will be given a 15-minute time slot whereby they will act as Trainee Solicitor and provide advice to the examiner who will be acting as the client. The advice will be given verbally and will be recorded via video. The client interview will be based on their findings within the memorandums previously submitted by the students. Students will summarise their findings and advise the client in everyday language that they can understand. Students should therefore avoid legal jargon or overly complex terms/language. Students will be asked one additional question by the client based on their matter and should respond to the best of their knowledge. The client interview will take place during the usual scheduled lecture time, though each student will be allocated their own 15-minute time slot during this period.

Learning and Teaching Strategies

The learning and teaching strategy is grounded in the University's commitment to an Active Learning Framework (ALF) so that learning will be both accessible and active, and include synchronous and a-synchronous elements. Face to face classroom teaching will be supplemented by online lectures wherein students will be expected to complete activities such as watching Panopto videos; undertake additional reading; complete quizzes and exercises; and post comment for a-synchronous debate. Added to this, will be access to staff who provide presence, challenge and support for student learning and can relate learning to real world uses.
