Module aims

The module is designed to support students in developing and completing a dissertation based on a topic drawn from their study of the individual LLB modules. Students are given the opportunity to develop independent research and argumentation skills, and to acquire knowledge on a discrete set of legal issues chosen by themselves.

1	To construct a research questions focussed on a specific area of law
2	To engage critically with legal research and scholarship on a specific research question
3	To critically analyse information from a comprehensive range of legal sources
4	To compose a commentary and make carefully constructed arguments on an issue in a specific area of law from the jurisdiction of England and/or Wales
5	To communicate the findings of research fluently in an extended piece of writing

Learning and Teaching Strategies
