Module aims

To familiarise students with ethical processes for gathering, analysing and presenting research.

Module Learning Outcomes

At the end of this module, students will be able to:

1	Critically review the challenges associated with contemporary criminological and criminal justice issues to define a feasible and clearly focused area of research.
2	Critically review the evidence base to identify the nature and potential causes of the identified criminological or criminal justice issue.
3	Critically review seminal and contemporary research to inform a practical, ethical and legally informed response to the identified issue within the criminal justice system.
4	Present the findings of a research project on a specific criminological or criminal justice issue at a student research conference.

Assessment

Indicative Assessment Tasks:

This section outlines the type of assessment task the student will be expected to complete as part of the module. More details will be made available in the relevant academic year module handbook.

Assessment 1: Dissertation

The undergraduate dissertation involves completing a 6,000-word literature/theory-based project that does not involve primary or secondary data collection; students will follow a structured format including:

- Chapter 1: Introduction - 1500 words
- Chapter 2: Critical Literature Review - 1500 words
- Chapter 3: Thematic Analysis - 1500 words
- Chapter 4: Discussion and Conclusion -1500 words
- Reference List

Assessment 2: Presentation

On completion of the dissertation, students will conclude the module with a 15-minute viva-style conference in Semester 2, where they will present their dissertation and discuss their key ideas.

Learning and Teaching Strategies

The learning and teaching strategy is grounded in the University's commitment to an Active Learning Framework (ALF) so that learning will be both accessible and active and include synchronous and a-synchronous elements.
