3	Appraise appropriate research methods that align with the selected methodological approach.
4	Analyse and apply ethical principles to chosen research approach.

Assessment

Indicative Assessment Tasks:

This section outlines the type of assessment task the student will be expected to complete as part of the module. More details will be made available in the relevant academic year module handbook.

There are 2 elements of assessment for this module:

Assessment 1:

Attendance – students must maintain attendance of 80% to meet the requirements of the professional qualification.

Assessment 2:

Using a template students will complete a research proposal to design a piece of research that informs practice. This will include:

- an introduction outlining the need for the research (250 words),
- a brief literature review evaluating 3 relevant and contemporary empirical pieces of research (500 words)
- the selection and application of research methods and methodological frameworks (600 words)
- a consideration of ethical principles required to undertake the research (500 words)
- a conclusion outlining the unique contribution of the proposed research (150 words)

Learning and Teaching Strategies

A variety of teaching and learning activities will be employed on this module, predominantly those that emphasises interactive learning and student participation. These will include practical classes and workshops; case studies and problem-based learning activities, class and small-group discussion, simulation and group work.
