### Module aims

This module will provide the opportunity to critically analyse core theories that inform youth and community work practice, and how social and political factors impact on work with young people and communities. It will be an opportunity to critically examine how these combine to shape professional identity and undertake 180 hours of placement activity.

#### **Assessment**

Indicative Assessment Tasks:

This section outlines the type of assessment task the student will be expected to complete as part of the module. More details will be made available in the relevant academic year module handbook.

#### **Assessment 1:**

Attendance – students must maintain attendance of 80% to meet the requirements of the professional qualification

#### **Assessment 2:**

A Pass/Refer portfolio on the student's placement experience that leads to a critical appraisal of the core skills, competencies and standards required for professional youth and community work. The portfolio will include:

- Personal statement
- National Occupational Standards Checklist
- Professional Development Plan
- Placement timesheets, and supervisors report

### **Assessment 3:**

An individual presentation lasting 20 minutes that demonstrates how the student has planned, delivered and critically evaluated educational activities in youth and community work settings in line with key pedagogical theories.

### **Assessment 4:**

Reflective Log to include

- Reflective practice statement critically exploring the role of reflective practice in developing professional identity and youth and community work practice (1000 words)
- 3 x reflective journals on critical incidents whilst on placement critically applying key theories relating to youth and community work practice (2,500 words)

## **Learning and Teaching Strategies**

A variety of teaching and learning activities will be employed on this module, predominantly those that emphasises interactive learning and student participation. These will include practical classes and workshops; case studies and problem-based learning activities, class and small-group discussion, simulation and group work.

This module will adopt a Hy-Flex approach to teaching and learning, in line with the Active Learning Framework. This means that students can join the classroom in person or join synchronously online to engage in the learning activities. Sessions will also be recorded for students to engage with alongside asynchronous online learning activities to scaffold the learning from the module.

### **Welsh Elements**

The placement portfolio will be made available in Welsh.
