Module Aims

This module aims to unify the skills developed throughout your work placement learning and academic studies at University in readiness for the responsibilities of employment as a Registered Veterinary Nurse.

The concept of clinical governance will be explored and activities that veterinary nurses can undertake to ensure that the quality of their professional practice provides improved outcomes for their patients and clients. This module will cover the legal and ethical frameworks within the profession and the challenges and difficulties that may arise.

Throughout the programme the RCVS Day One Skills have been embedded and developed in specific modules. This module includes the student being assessed on a sample of the RCVS day one competencies and skills in a 10 station scenario-based Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE). The student veterinary nurse will also have to provide evidence that they have completed the required minimum 1800 hours of work-related learning in a veterinary training practice and that their Nursing Progress Log (NPL) is completed (100%).

Students must have completed their NPL and work-based learning hours (1800), three weeks prior to the OSCE.
