Module aims

This module aims to consolidate learning from academic study and work-based placement in preparation for professional practice as a Registered Veterinary Nurse. It focuses on developing students' understanding of professional responsibilities, including legal and ethical frameworks, and the challenges encountered within veterinary practice. The principles of clinical governance are explored, with emphasis on their role in maintaining standards, promoting continuous improvement, and improving outcomes for patients and clients.

The module provides opportunities for students to demonstrate competence in delivering veterinary nursing clinics under supervision, including patient assessment, preventative healthcare, and effective professional communication. Throughout the programme, the RCVS Day One Skills and Day One Competences are embedded and developed; within this module, students are formally assessed against a representative sample of these requirements through a ten-station scenario-based Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE).

In addition, students must provide evidence of completion of the required minimum of 1,800 hours of work-based learning in an approved training practice and full completion of the Nursing Progress Log (NPL). Both the NPL and work-based learning hours must be completed at least three weeks prior to the OSCE.

Assessment

Indicative Assessment Tasks:

This section outlines the type of assessment task the student will be expected to complete as part of the module. More details will be made available in the relevant academic year module handbook.

Assessment 1: Students will deliver an individual 20-minute presentation analysing the professional responsibilities of a Registered Veterinary Nurse and evaluating the concept of clinical governance and its impact on the veterinary profession.

Assessment 2: Objective Structured Clinical Examinations (OSCEs) are used to assess students' practical skills, clinical reasoning and professional behaviours in a controlled environment. Students rotate through a series of stations designed to reflect real veterinary nursing scenarios, demonstrating safe and effective practice in line with RCVS Day One Skills and competences.

*To enter the OSCE, students must have completed their NPL and accrued the required minimum work-based learning hours in a veterinary training practice (1800 hours) three weeks prior to the examination.

Learning and Teaching Strategies

Learning and teaching on this module will be underpinned by the University's Active Learning Framework (ALF) and will adopt a student-centred, practice-focused approach that supports the development of placement readiness, professional judgement and evidence-based veterinary nursing practice.

A range of learning and teaching methods will be utilised, including:

- Interactive lectures
- Seminars and workshops
- Scenario-based learning activities
- Guided communication activities and role-play,
- Directed academic skills sessions

Opportunities for formative learning and feedback will be embedded throughout the module to support skill development and prepare students for summative assessment and placement expectations, including communication role play / risk assessment activity / study skill activities (literature searches, peer review writing tasks). A range of modalities will be used by the tutor to provide feedback to students.

Learning and teaching will take place in classroom and simulated clinical environments where appropriate, enabling students to make clear connections between theory, professional behaviour and practice.
