Production Project

1. Editing in Context

Students will edit a short film or films that may utilise material provided by the tutor.
The task will involve creating a narrative through thoughtful editing choices,
incorporating appropriate transitions, sound design, and visual effects to enhance
storytelling.

2. Project Diary

 A 1000-word project diary outlining the editing process, discussing key technical and creative decisions, and evaluating how these choices contributed to the final product.
