Module aims

This module critically examines advanced concepts in adaptation, exploring how stories are transformed across different media forms. Building on skills from Level 5, students will analyse complex adaptation strategies and create their own innovative, media-spanning adaptations.

Module Learning Outcomes

At the end of this module, students will be able to:

1	Critically evaluate advanced theories and practices in adaptation across media.
2	Analyse and compare strategies for adapting narratives to diverse media forms.
3	Demonstrate advanced creative and technical skills in developing media adaptations.
4	Implement practical processes and workflows to create adaptive storytelling projects.

Assessment: Creative Adaptation

- 1. Students will adapt an adaptation (or sequence of smaller texts in negotiation with the tutor) of a source (e.g., literary work, historical event, element of media, or other cultural artefact) into a media format of their choice, demonstrating advanced creative and technical skills.
- 2. Reflective diary that critically evaluates the creative decisions, processes, and theoretical concepts underpinning the adaptation.

Learning and Teaching Strategies

Instruction and learning are delivered through various methods, including lectures, workshops, seminars, small group tutorials, Q&A sessions and online delivery via ALF. This would include blended learning with accessible online content, prioritising flexibility and inclusivity.

Many classes are exercise-based, promoting active student engagement in their learning process. One-on-one consultations with personal tutors and the presence of regular presentations throughout the course encourages students to engage in reflective learning.

- Study of case studies showcasing innovative and unconventional adaptations.
- Examination of ethical, cultural, and creative considerations in adaptation practice.
- Development of students' own media-spanning adaptations, focusing on innovation and originality.
- Reflection on the adaptation process and evaluation of creative outcomes.
