**Assessment:**

Assessment for this module consists of 100% coursework, and comprises 2 assignments: A presentation, on a subject agreed between the student and the module tutor (50%) and a Portfolio (50%)

The purpose of this presentation is to develop communication skills. It also gives the opportunity to demonstrate the student's ability both to research and prepare a topic for presentation, and to present it effectively to others.

All students will be required to submit a Portfolio which will contain all of the following elements:

1. Evidence of a self-marked essay.
2. Notes and evaluations of all lectures and whole group sessions.
3. A Project Plan for a task, project or extended exercise relevant to the subject area.
4. Examples of an outline Literature Review, Bibliography and Synopsis as appropriate to subject component specific outputs
5. Two detailed CV's and outline career development plan
6. A record and evaluation of a completed presentation.

**Learning and Teaching Strategies:**

The module will be delivered using an appropriate range of teaching learning strategies including whole group lectures and presentations, seminars and tutorials, directed access to on-line materials and testing resources, in-session exercises and presentations. Effective Presentations, Project Management, Mind Mapping and Effective Study Techniques, Enterprise Awareness and Career Planning will account for 40% of formal taught sessions. The further 60% will concentrate on more subject-specific issues concerning the performing arts industry and study in the subject such as presentations, critical methods and approaches to the study of respective subject components, assignment writing and assessment criteria in respective subject areas.

**Syllabus outline:**

The module will cover four key areas:

1. Essential academic and study skills, knowledge and practices required for HE study  
Core generic study skills including:

Note-taking and information retrieval, effective use of lectures and seminars, mind-mapping, research methods and research skills, effective presentations, academic writing (planning, structuring, research, drafting and editing, assessment criteria), forms of academic writing (case studies, literature reviews, projects, performances, dissertations, critical thinking and critical reasoning, effective revision techniques

2. Essential academic approaches, methodological issues and skills which are specific to the study of respective specialist component subject(s)

Subject-specific consideration and development of the generic skills and issues as appropriate for the successful study of respective subject components, including assessment and performance-based issues (e.g. critical and methodological approaches; specific referencing considerations; relevant and appropriate research and information processing and retrieval approaches; subject-specific issues and approaches in relation to argument and the presentation of evidence; assessment criteria, etc.)

3. Essential personal transferable and generic skills

Core skills in communication, presentation, time management, project management, use of IT, numeracy, independent and group work, leadership and management, research etc.

4. Identification and development of generic personal and professional development

Understanding of personal strengths and areas for development in areas such as maintaining and updating an effective CV; identification of priorities for career and professional development, including effective use of career preference questionnaires and on-line exercises; enterprise and entrepreneurial practice; subject-specific career and professional development priorities.
