### Module aims

This module is designed for IFY students who need to improve their IELTS 5.5 entry score to the requisite score of IELTS 6.0 (with no individual skill below 5.5) for entry to their UG/PG studies at Wrexham University. The overall aim is to help students hone their productive and receptive skills to enable them to engage better with complex texts and express their ideas with greater fluency and accuracy. Listening tasks will focus on identifying key arguments, opinions, and nuances in extended spoken texts, while speaking practice will emphasize logical organization, precise vocabulary use, and improved diction. Reading activities will develop students' ability to analyse structure, argument, and implicit meaning in both academic and general texts. Writing tasks will concentrate on producing well-structured essays with clear arguments, a range of complex sentence structures, and advanced academic vocabulary as well as subject-specific vocabulary. By achieving the required pass mark overall and in each individual skill in the final assessment, students will fulfil the University's English language entry criteria for their degree programme.

## **Module Learning Outcomes**

At the end of this module, students will be able to:

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1	Demonstrate a 0.5 IELTS-band improvement in reading skills from 5.5 to 6.0 (or equivalent) by showing greater accuracy in understand the structure, tone, and implicit meaning of longer academic and general texts, employing improved skimming and scanning strategies.
2	Demonstrate a 0.5 IELTS-band improvement in writing skills from 5.5 to 6.0 (or equivalent) by producing well-structured essays with a clear introduction, body, and conclusion, using more varied sentence structures and a wider range of academic vocabulary while reducing grammatical errors.
3	Demonstrate a 0.5 IELTS-band improvement in listening skills from 5.5 to 6.0 (or equivalent) by showing a greater ability to follow longer and more complex spoken texts, identifying key arguments, opinions, and implied meanings with greater accuracy.
4	Demonstrate a 0.5 IELTS-band improvement in speaking skills from 5.5 to 6.0 (or equivalent) by expressing opinions and ideas more fluently on a variety of topics, using more precise vocabulary, better organisation of ideas, and fewer pauses or hesitations.

# **Learning and Teaching Strategies**

The module integrates course book content with a broad range of supplementary written and spoken materials accessible via VLE. Teaching and learning sessions will be delivered via big group lectures, tutorials, and pair/group work. These sessions will draw on a variety of language learning resources to encourage independent study to reinforce classroom learning. Active learning will be encouraged through weekly activities including a vocabulary journal and quizzes, writing workshops and peer review, listening logs (e.g., TED Talks, lectures), group discussions on academic topics, one-to-one tutorials and feedback sessions. Progress tests will be scheduled regularly so that students can track their own learning journey and take on board suggestions on how to make their learning more effective.
