Module aims

The module aims to ensure that students develop key academic, personal and professional skills required for successful study at higher education level. The module will focus on effective time management around study/work and personal life, developing the required skills for study such as reading, writing and literature searching which will ensure a successful transition to level 4 and beyond to level 5 and 6 as well as preparing students for subsequent employment and/or further study.

1	Demonstrate familiarity and confidence with the use, application and development of core study and academic skills including the use of digital skills, preparation for presentations and formats for academic writing
2	Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of transferrable soft skills and develop priorities for personal, professional and career development
3	Understand and develop the skills needed to effectively manage time around their study
4	Apply knowledge in the use of subject-specific academic skills and approaches as appropriate for their respective subject area and select and present evidence of their learning, including the ability to reflect on the learning process.

Students will develop a portfolio of evidence through a variety of means such as:

- *Oral presentation*

The students will be expected to develop their skills in completing the tasks as each will be an integral part of the learning process which can then be transferred to level 4 and beyond, and prepare students for subsequent employment and further study
